ESSENTIAL INFORMATION



DRINKING WATER Water in Singapore is potable and safe enough to drink from the tap.



ELECTRICITY The voltage here is 220-240 AC, 50 Hz.



LANGUAGE

English is the language primarily spoken in Singapore. Mandarin, Malay and Tamil, together with other dialects, are used as well.



SMOKING

Smoking is prohibited in all air-conditioned areas, common corridors, void decks and staircases within residential buildings, outdoor hospital compounds, as well as within a 5-metre radius from any building entrance/exit and bus shelter.



LOST PASSPORT/ SINGAPORE IMMIGRATION SERVICES

If you've lost your passport, make a police report, then head to Immigration & Checkpoints Authority (10 Kallang Road, 6391-6100) to get a temporary visa. Finally, inform your embassy so you can get through customs to reach home

FINANCIAL INFORMATION



CURRENCY EXCHANGE

Singapore's currency is the Singapore dollar (S\$ or SGD). Money changers can be found at Changi Airport, shopping centres and hotels around the island. There is also an abundance of automated teller machines (ATMs) that accept most major credit cards, such as Visa, MasterCard and American Express



Tipping is not widely practiced in Singapore, as most hotels and restaurants apply a default 10% service charge.

GST REFUND


To enjoy a refund on the 7% Goods and Services Tax (GST) paid on your purchases, you need to make at least \$100 worth of purchases from participating outlets that display a "Tax Refund" logo or a "Tax Free Shopping" logo.





Request for a refund voucher upon purchase, which you should present at the airport's Tax Refund Counter (along with your purchases, receipts and passport) before you depart the country.

DIICEC

Buses travel to almost every part of the island and fares start from 73 cents with an EZ-link card (a pre-paid card used by public transport commuters), and from \$1.10 for cash fares. For information on bus routes and related enquiries, call the TransitLink Hotline at 1800-225-5663 or visit www.sbstransit.com.sg.



MASS RAPID TRANSIT (MRT)

The world-class trains here are air-conditioned and comfortable, and run from about 6am to midnight. Single trip tickets (from 73 cents with an EZ-Link card; from \$1.10 for cash fares) can be purchased from vending machines at all MRT stations. 

SINGAPORE IN NUMBERS



WHAT'S THAT?

Most Singaporeans pepper their speech with colloquial Singlish. Here are a few basic terms that you'll be hearing quite often.

Chope

Reserve a seat (mainly in hawker centres or food courts, usually with a packet of tissue/umbrella/some small object). e.g. "Let's *chope* a seat so we can go order our food."

•

Kena

To suffer from.

e.g. "I *kena* scolded by my boss for not finishing my work."

Lah

A signature *Singlish* exclamation (with no real meaning of its own) that is usually attached to the end of a phrase or statement.

•

e.g. "okay lah", "because I'm hungry lah"

l iao

Already (also frequently used at the end of a statement). e.g. "I've finished all my meetings for today *liao.*"

Shiok

An expression that denotes satisfaction or pleasure. e.g. "This chilli crab is so *shiok*!"

Ta pau

Take away (used in relation to food). e.g. "Can I ta pau a packet of noodles?"




